ITEM #1 Call to Order.

Chairman Sheila Murray called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.

ITEM #2 Approval of minutes

Sheila Womach made a motion to approve the minutes of the December 4, 2018 meeting. Second by Jill Miller. Motion carried 8-0.

ITEM #3 Discussion on community concerns

None were expressed, Chair Murray asked to move on to police interaction.

ITEM #4 Interaction with Police Department

Chief Connally gave a PowerPoint presentation on crime and police issues. He also explained the changes and differences between UCR and IBR reporting. Index crimes are down 8.8% for the year. Part one violent crime is down 7%. Aggravated Assault increased by 6 assaults, however the percentage of those that were domestic aggravated assaults accounted for 58%. Robberies are the lowest they have been since 2005.

Chief Connally gave a review of the annual report from Support Services. The Communication Center answered 202,374 calls during 2018, averaging 555 calls per day. Crime Prevention had 85 neighborhood watch meeting during the year. Chief Connally also discussed the Joint Citizens Academy, Cops Care Youth Camp, and National Night Out. Crime Prevention also offers site security surveys. Chief Connally also discussed our numerous volunteers and the programs they

work. The fleet accumulated 1,122,300 miles last year and our two mechanics completed 1251 work orders to keep the fleet up and running.

Commander Hart gave a review of the annual report from the detective division. Detectives reviewed 17,160 reports and assigned 3,398 cases for further investigation. The division reached full staffing during 2018 and the new detectives continue to increase their effectiveness as they gain experience. The Electronic Crimes Unit processed 26 computers and 237 cellular phones during 2018. The Unit also rolled out a video portal to assist with providing better customer service. The Financial Crimes Unit continued their work on education and enforcement related to skimmers. The Family Crimes Unit conducted several operations to identify and assist victim of human trafficking.

Commander Protzman gave a review of the annual report from the Patrol Division. The Patrol division is the backbone of the department. Three Captains and twelve Sergeants oversee approximately 75 officers. With retirements and transfers 39% of the division has less than 3 years of experience. They are highly motivated and continue to improve their skills.
